Smitha Ahamed, DrPH, MA, MPH, serves as CEO of the East Georgia Cancer Coalition. appointments and an Acts of Kindness program to aid families facing increased financial crisis during their cancer journey. Lastly, each year Summit Quest publishes and freely distributes "Voices Over Cancer" with the goal of making all of our voices louder than the cancer that has impacted our lives.

Dr. Langston holds memberships with American Association for the Advancement of Science and American Society of Hematology. Dr. Langston

The abiding goal of Dr. McCullough's research is to improve cancer outcomes in underserved populations by identifying targets for pharmacologic, behavioral, and policy intervention.

She has served as Vice President of Marketing, Government Affairs and Strategic Planning at Phoebe Putney Memorial Hospital, as Interim Chief Advancement Officer at Darton State College, as past Chair of the Albany Area Chamber of Commerce, and immediate past Chair of the Albany Dougherty Economic Development Commission. Ms. Merchant is the co-founder of Strive2Thrive, an anti-poverty organization that provides a hand up instead of a hand out, helping people in Dougherty County

Despite having regular mammograms, Ms. Thevenot's cancer was missed due to dense breast tissue. She has turned her diagnosis and professional expertise into an opportunity to help other cancer patients by speaking about her experience and starting her own private patient advocacy practice, Clarity Patient Advocates. As a Board-Certified Patient Advocate, Ms. Thevenot works with cancer patients, helping them navigate the overwhelming and confusing healthcare landscape and guiding them along their cancer journey.



Kia Toodle, M.Ed., CPM is the Georgia Department of Public Health's Chronic Disease Prevention Section Director and Principal Investigator for 8 CDC Cooperative Agreements. Ms. Toodle's role is to prevent and control chronic disease through evidenced-based strategies and interventions to support a better quality of life, improve overall health, economic, and educational outcomes for families and communities in Georgia. Her leadership spans 5 Offices, overseeing an estimated 32 million dollars of federal and state funds. Ms. Toodle has over 27 years of diverse public health experience at the national, state, and local community level. Her last 20+ years have been with the Georgia Department of

Jessica S. Wells, PhD, RN, WHNP-BC, FAAN, is an Assistant Professor at Emory University's Nell Hodgson Woodruff School of Nursing. She received her undergraduate degree in nursing from Howard University in 2006; a PhD in Nursing along with a graduate certificate in Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies from the Laney Graduate School of Emory University in 2012; and a postdoctoral fellowship from Emory in 2015. Dr. Wells' research focuses on promoting cancer prevention strategies in the vulnerable HIV+ population. Her research is at the forefront of an emerging public health problem—an aging HIV population who is increasingly dying from HPV-related cancers. Her research has

been funded by national and federal agencies to promote cancer prevention strategies among people living with HIV including the National Institutes of Health, American Cancer Society, Woodruff Health Science Institute, and others. Dr. Wells is currently the Principal Investigator on a recently funded R01 study that aims to tailor and implement an evidence-based, multi-level intervention to promote HPV vaccination among people living with HIV.
